

The Virginia 250 Preservation Fund grant will allow Stratford Hall to significantly improve accessibility and the visitor experience by updating the public restrooms and pathways around the Great House so they are ADA compliant and replacing three roofs of buildings integral to the history and interpretation of Stratford Hall. Stratford Hall is located in the Northern Neck National Heritage Area, a region steeped in revolutionary history, and is helping to lead local 250th commemorative initiatives in partnership with Northern Neck 250 (NNK250).
