## **Carly Fiorina**

### VA250 National Honorary Chair Chair of The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation

Carly Fiorina began her career as a secretary for a nineperson real estate firm. She climbed the corporate ladder at AT&T and Lucent Technologies through a willingness to tackle tough problems, a relentless focus on producing results and accepting accountability, and a passion for leveraging the talents of others and building high-performance teams. She was recruited to Hewlett-Packard with a mission to transform the

company from a laggard to a leader, becoming the first woman to lead a Fortune 50 company. During her tenure as chair and CEO, Hewlett-Packard became the largest technology company in the world, innovation tripled, cash flow quadrupled, and revenue and profit growth accelerated.

Both government and the private sector have sought out her vast problem-solving, team building, and leadership experience. She has advised the U.S. Department of Defense, Central Intelligence Agency, State Department, and Department of Homeland Security. She founded Carly Fiorina Enterprises to bring her expertise to private sector teams, and the Unlocking Potential Foundation to allow those in the social sector to benefit from her experience. She is the author of three best-selling books on leadership for general audiences, as well as a weekly LinkedIn newsletter with over 500,000 subscribers. A frequent speaker to teams and executives of many industries all over the world, Carly believes that citizens and leaders in civil society have an important role and an enormous opportunity to drive positive change. In 2015, Carly launched a campaign for president. Americans came to know Carly as a clear-eyed, direct leader capable of solving problems and delivering results.

Carly is a member of the newly formed American Bar Association Task Force for American Democracy, which is focused on those actions necessary to improve citizens' confidence in American elections. She serves as the founding visionary and executive chair of The Williamsburg Institute, where history-makers meet, and also serves on the Board of Visitors for James Madison University.

### Ken Burns

#### Award-Winning Filmmaker

Ken Burns has been making documentary films for almost 50 years. Since the Academy Award-nominated *Brooklyn Bridge* in 1981, Ken has gone on to direct and produce some of the most acclaimed historical documentaries ever made. A December 2002 poll conducted by *Real Screen Magazine* listed *The Civil War* as second only to Robert Flaherty's *Nanook of the North* as the "most influential documentary of all time," and named Ken Burns and Robert Flaherty as the "most influential documentary makers" of all time.



In March 2009, David Zurawik of *The Baltimore Sun* said, "... Burns is not only the greatest documentarian of the day, but also the most influential filmmaker period. That includes feature filmmakers like George Lucas and Steven Spielberg. I say that because Burns not only turned millions of persons onto history with his films, he showed us a new way of looking at our collective past and ourselves." The late historian Stephen Ambrose said of his films, "More Americans get their history from Ken Burns than any other source." And Wynton Marsalis has called Ken "a master of timing, and of knowing the sweet spot of a story, of how to ask questions to get to the basic human feeling and to draw out the true spirit of a given subject." Ken's films have been honored with dozens of major awards, including 17 Emmy Awards, two Grammy Awards and two Oscar nominations. In September of 2008, at the News & Documentary Emmy Awards, Ken was honored by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences with a Lifetime Achievement Award. In November of 2022, Ken was inducted into the Television Academy Hall of Fame.

Ken has been the recipient of more than thirty honorary degrees and has delivered many treasured commencement addresses. He is a sought-after public speaker, appearing at colleges, civic organizations, and business group events throughout the country.

Ken was born in Brooklyn, New York, in 1953. He graduated from Hampshire College in 1975 and is one of the co-founders of Florentine Films.



## Rick Atkinson Pulitzer Prize-Winning Author

A winner of Pulitzer Prizes for history and journalism, Rick Atkinson has produced a remarkable oeuvre of bestselling history that includes the Liberation Trilogy (the first volume, An Army at Dawn: The War in North Africa, 1942–1943, received the Pulitzer for history), The Long Gray Line, Crusade, In the Company of Soldiers, and, most recently, The British Are Coming,

the critically acclaimed first volume of his eagerly anticipated Revolution Trilogy. A multi-week New York Times bestseller, The British Are Coming won the George Washington Prize (awarded by Mount Vernon and its partners), the New-York Historical Society's Barbara and David Zalaznick Book Prize, the Daughters of the American Revolution Excellence in American History Book Award, and the Fraunces Tavern Museum Book Award.



## Sarah Botstein Award-Winning Producer & Filmmaker

Sarah Botstein has produced some of the most popular and acclaimed documentaries on PBS. Her work with Ken Burns and Lyn Novick includes Jazz, The War, Prohibition, The Vietnam War, College Behind Bars, and Hemingway. The U.S. and the Holocaust marked Botstein's debut as a co-director. The series tells the story of how the American people grappled with one of

the greatest humanitarian tragedies in history. Botstein is an original contributor to Ken Burns' UNUM, a web-based platform that highlights historical themes across the Florentine Films body of work. Botstein works closely with PBS Learning Media and WETA-TV to develop educational content for programming as part of the Ken Burns Classroom. She served as a co-director and producer of The American Revolution and a three-part series about Lyndon B. Johnson.

### Kitcki Carroll

**Executive Director, United South and Eastern Tribes** 

Kitcki A. Carroll is an enrolled citizen of the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes and a descendant of Cheyenne Peace Chief, Chief Black Kettle. Since 2010, he has proudly served as the Executive Director for United South and Eastern Tribes, Inc. (USET) and the USET Sovereignty Protection Fund (USET SPF), a non-profit and inter-tribal organization representing thirty-three



(33) federally recognized Tribal Nations (first contact Tribal Nations) from the Northeastern Woodlands, down the Atlantic coast to the Everglades, and across the Gulf of Mexico. Established in 1969, USET and USET SPF collectively advocate on behalf of its thirty-three-member Tribal Nations at the regional and national level. In his capacity as Executive Director, Mr. Carroll works to protect and promote the sovereignty rights of USET/USET SPF members. He is a strong advocate for all Native people and actively works to ensure that the United States recognizes, honors, and fulfills its sacred trust and treaty responsibilities and obligations to Indian Country. He has held various Executive/Senior leadership positions in the tribal government and not-for-profit justice and advocacy sector for the past 23 years and has served/serves on various workgroups, panels, task forces, boards, and advisory groups.

### The Honorable Douglas Ginsburg Senior Judge, United States Court of Appeals

Circuit Judge Douglas H. Ginsburg was appointed to the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in 1986; he served as Chief Judge from 2001 to 2008. After receiving his BS from Cornell University in 1970, and his JD from the University of Chicago Law School in 1973, he clerked on the D.C. Circuit and for Justice Thurgood Marshall on the United States Supreme Court. Thereafter, until joining the court, Judge Ginsburg



was a professor at the Harvard Law School and the Assistant Attorney General in charge of the Antitrust Division of the Department of Justice.

For the last several years Judge Ginsburg has been developing materials for civic education, including documentary programs for public television on the Constitution ("A More or Less Perfect Union") and on the Declaration of Independence ("We Hold These Truths"). His Civics Fundamentals (civicsfundamentals.org) comprises 100 two- to three-minute videos addressing the questions on the U.S. citizenship test and explaining the history and reasons behind the answers. It is available free of charge, as are curriculum plans and other supporting materials for teachers

## **Caroline Klibanoff**

CEO, Made By Us

Caroline Klibanoff works at the intersection of civic engagement, history, and culture. She leads Made By Us, an unprecedented nationwide collaboration to ignite and inform Millennial and Gen Z civic participation as we approach the United States' 250th anniversary in 2026. Through efforts like My Wish For U.S., the Civic Season, and digital, social, and local initiatives, Made By Us



brings historical expertise to meet young adults where they are, to inform and inspire conversations about America's future. Previously, she project managed exhibitions for MIT Museum and worked in digital strategy for the Bridge Alliance, running the Civvys Awards, and working on the inaugural National Week of Conversation. She began her career in strategic communications at the Pew Research Center and the Frameworks Institute and has worked for cultural organizations including Longfellow House – George Washington's Headquarters National Historic Site; Northern Light Productions; HistoryCambridge; and Northeastern University's Digital Scholarship Group. She holds a B.A. in American studies and film and media studies from Georgetown University, and an M.A. in public history and digital humanities from Northeastern University.

## David Schmidt Producer & Director

David Schmidt is the producer and co-director, along with Ken Burns and Sarah Botstein, of *The American Revolution*, a six-part, 12-hour series premiering on PBS in the fall of 2025.

Schmidt began working with Florentine Films as a researcher and apprentice editor for The Roosevelts



(2014), while also supervising the documentary's seven-episode script. His research on *The Vietnam War* (2017) won him the Jane Mercer Footage Researcher of the Year Award, and he also worked closely on that project with writer Geoffrey C. Ward and helped coordinate postproduction. With Burns, Schmidt also produced the two-part biography *Benjamin Franklin* (2022) for PBS.



## Alan Taylor Pulitzer Prize-Winning Historian

A graduate of Colby College (1977), Alan Taylor received his doctorate in American History from Brandeis University in 1986. After a postdoctoral fellowship at the Institute of Early American History and Culture (Williamsburg, Virginia) 1985 - 1987, he taught at Boston University, 1987-1994; the University of California at Davis, 1994-2014; and the University of

Virginia, where he held the Thomas Jefferson Foundation Chair, 2014-2024. In 2016-2017 he served as the Harmsworth Professor at Queens College, Oxford University.

Taylor has published eleven books. For a dozen years, Taylor served as the faculty advisor for the California State Social Science and History Project, which provides curriculum support and professional development for K-12 teachers in history and social studies. In 2002, he won the University of California at Davis Award for Teaching and Scholarly Achievement and the Phi Beta Kappa, Northern California Association, Teaching Excellence Award.

In 2016 he won membership in the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and in 2020 received membership in the American Philosophical Society.



## The Honorable John Charles Thomas Justice, Supreme Court of Virginia (retired)

John Charles Thomas graduated from The University of Virginia with a Bachelor of Arts in American Government in 1972. He received his Juris Doctor from the University of Virginia Law School in 1975. Thomas joined the law firm Hunton & Williams and became a partner in April 1982. In 1983, he was appointed to the Supreme Court of Virginia as the first African American, and at 32, the youngest person to serve there.

Following his retirement from the Supreme Court of Virginia in 1989, Thomas practiced law in Richmond, Virginia as part of the Hunton Andrews Kurth LLP firm. In 1995, he received the NAACP's Lifetime Image Award. In 2005, Thomas was named a member of the Court of Arbitration for Sport, based in Lausanne, Switzerland, which hears cases arising from world-class sporting competitions and has global jurisdiction. In 2006, Thomas was appointed to the Board of Visitors of William & Mary, a position to which he was reappointed in 2009. He joined The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation's Board of Trustees in November 2023.

### **Pete Williams**

#### **Emmy Award-Winning Journalist**

Pete Williams covered the U.S. Supreme Court and Departments of Justice and Homeland Security for NBC News for 29 years as a correspondent based in Washington, DC. *The Atlantic* called him the "media hero of the Boston bombing coverage" for his "clear, careful, accurate reporting in a sea of media confusion." Regarding his live account of the Supreme Court's



decision ending the 2000 presidential election dispute, former President George W. Bush wrote, "I probably became the first person to learn he had won the presidency while lying in bed with his wife watching TV."

Williams is the recipient of four national news Emmy Awards, two Edward R. Murrow Awards, and the John F. Hogan Award from the Radio Television Digital News Association. He is now a member of the board of directors of WyoFile, a non-profit news organization in Wyoming. Prior to joining NBC News, Williams was an aide in the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives. In 1986, he joined the staff of then-Congressman Dick Cheney as press secretary and legislative assistant. In 1989, when Cheney became Secretary of Defense, Williams was confirmed by the Senate as Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs.

A native of Casper, Wyoming and a 1974 graduate of Stanford University, Williams was a reporter and news director at *KTWO-TV* and *Radio* in Casper from 1974 to 1985. He successfully lobbied the Wyoming Supreme Court to permit broadcast coverage of its proceedings and twice sued Wyoming judges over pre-trial exclusion of reporters from the courtroom. For these efforts, he received a First Amendment Award from the Society of Professional Journalists.
